#### **Convention Conduct/Hotel Policies**

ECA will not tolerate harassment among convention attendees of any sort, including unwanted sexual attention, stalking, or non-consensual physical contact. If you see or experience something, say something: Please report concerns to Pamela Lannutti, President, or First Vice **President, Jennifer Waldeck.** The hotel reserves the right to refuse to serve alcoholic beverages to anyone who appears to be underage and cannot produce proper identification, or to anyone who appears to be intoxicated.
- 4. ECA is responsible for any damage to hotel premises. Please act responsibly in your guest room and meeting rooms. 

Mark C. Hopson, Ph.D. serves as Professor in the School of Communication, and Senior Director of Ethnic Studies Programs at Chapman University. His research interests and publications include critical intercultural communication and diversity, African American rhetorical traditions, the rhetoric of social movements, and the communication of violence prevention. Dr. Hopson earned a Ph.D. in Intercultural Communication from Ohio University, and B.A. and M.A. degrees in Organizational Communication from Western Michigan University. Prior to joining Chapman, Dr. Hopson held a faculty position and served as Director of African and African American Studies at George Mason University in Fairfax, VA. He also served on the university's 2020 Taskforce on Anti-Racism and Inclusive Excellence for the Office of the President. Moreover, Dr. Hopson has facilitated workshops and seminars for more than 5,000 youth and adult learners, including Changing Lives Through Literature for Fairfax County Public Libraries. CLTL is a nationally recognized alternative sentencing program for juvenile offenders.



Marshall McLuhan, in his now-famous 1969 interview with Playboy magazine, claimed that the majority of people fail to understand the consequences of new technologies because of what he called the "rearview-mirror" view of the world. Carrying this idea forward, Neil Postman wanted media ecology to function as a field of inquiry focusing on the study of media as environment. He envisioned media ecology as a "curriculum of the future" that would help students survive the new media environments. At its inception, McLuhan and Postman framed media ecology as an intellectual tradition that should be well equipped to contend with technological innovation and change. However, in the half century since Postman's articulation of media ecology, the tradition has gained a reputation, rightly or wrongly, as a field of Luddites, technological pessimists, and technological determinists. How did a field of inquiry so committed to understanding technological innovation come to be known as such a reactionary field of inquiry? How can the field continue to contend with innovation? Is there room for innovation within the media ecology tradition? The assembled papers in the panel contend with the idea of innovation and its place within media ecology.

# Encouraging Faculty Wellness and Wellbeing: Coping through Meditative Reflection and Creative Collaboration

Presenters:

The pandemic was hard on faculty and students alike, but faculty and administrators focused largely on student needs rather than on those of faculty. Faculty are now chronically stressed, tobthe point that they are leaving higher ed in large numbers, as several studies note. For example, a landmark study conducted by the Chronicle of Higher and Fidelity Investments notes that the majority of faculty are experiencing elevated levels of frustration, anxiety, and stress to the point that more than half of all faculty in the U.S. are considering retiring or changing careers and leaving higher education. These findings suggest that tenured faculty members are even more likely to retire than others (Chronicle and Fidelity, 2020). Another study by Course Hero (2021) found that faculty anxiety appears to be increasing, with more faculty reporting peak stress now than at the beginning of the pandemic - with serious implications for professors' mental health, their students, and the profession.

This brief workshop provides a space for faculty to reflect and process about pandemic related stress. Workshop participants will be invited to meditate on these issues before collaboratively processing their experiences through found poetry. Pixy Ferris will offer an experiential introduction to zen meditation, followed by a 15-minute sitting meditation session. This inward-looking coping technique will be followed by an inward-to-outward session in which Jennifer Owlett will provide faculty with space for collaboratively reflecting on their instructional experiences during the pandemic through a "found poetry" session.



The Future as Innovation: Developing and Assessing Core Communication Competencies for an Undergraduate Organizational Communication Curriculum

This interactive panel will extend the Core Competencies for Introductory Communication Courses project introduced by Engleberg et al. (2017) to the undergraduate organizational communication course curriculum. In their project, Engleberg et al. identified seven core competencies (i.e., monitoring and presenting your self, practicing communication ethics, adapting to others, practicing effective listening, expressing messages, identifying and explaining fundamental communication processes, creating and analyzing message strategies) that they are argued should constitute the basis for introductory communication courses.

The panelists will provide an overview of their project, with a specific focus on the seven core communication competencies. Using these competencies as a model, audience members will be asked to identify a set of core communication competencies that they believe undergraduate organizational communication majors should possess upon completing any undergraduate organizational communication curriculum. The panelists then will facilitate a discussion of the resulting competencies, with a further focus on (a) identifying organizational communication constructs, concepts, perspectives, and theories that align with each competency, (b) recommending additional core competencies as needed, and (c) proposing assessment techniques for each core communication competency.

It is recommended, but not necessary, that audience members review the Engleberg et al. article prior to attending this session.

In addition, the approach to this panel is to invite and integrate the audience feedback, family members, and local students, who are central to our anti-racism motivation and are immersed in the stories about race and/or our teaching environments. We view this as innovative and practical. Often the voices of family members and the "generation following" are presented and interpreted through the researchers' voices. We desire and promote the presence of our family members who are central to the stories within the book chapter, and we encourage our University based student presence.

When the United States Supreme Court issued its ruling in Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization in late June of this year, the conservative majority effectively overturned nearly 50 years of constitutional precedent that afforded women the right to legal abortion. Roe v. Wade and Planned Parenthood v. Casey were scuttled and the matter of abortion was returned to individual states for adjudication. Those on the political right applauded the Dobbs decision as a long-overdue reaffirmation of the sanctity of pre-born life and the primacy of states' rights, while those on the political left argued that the Court dealt a deeply misogynistic blow to American women, stripping them of personal autonomy and inviting disastrous social consequences. The position papers offered by the participants on this panel examine the end of Roe from various communication perspectives.

Short Course: Understanding and Utilizing the Agenda-Spin Model for Rhetoric in General and Political Persuasion

The Short Courses, "Teaching Persuasion: A Revolt," taught at both the National Communication Association and Eastern Communication Association in 2014, focused on the process of how speakers, writers, and communicators of all kinds, perhaps most particularly political persuaders, make meanings, create saliences, and frame and spin facts and events in order to shape public perceptions and opinions. This view of rhetoric is quite contrary to the view of many, which is to base persuasion on what they claim "reality" dictates. This short course is perfect for our "harboring innovation" in my hometown of Baltimore and is related to the ECA's Agenda-Spin Award.

Public discourse, to be an actual influence, must be persuasive, not only in getting across one particular point-of-view or opinion, but also in whether it facilitates the kind of discourse that can resolve problems, reconcile differences, and/or find solutions. Persuasion is always grounded in some world view, some ideological perspective, regardless of the politics of the communicator, no matter the motives of those who have stakes in controlling public discourse.

The Agenda/Spin Model first analyzes how matters become or do not become "issues;" then the model is utilized to determine what perspective or spin or what the meaning and significance of the issue becomes for the audience(s). The current national polarized debate about what issues should hold the public attention -- the border crisis, inflation, the economy, abortion, violent crime, the Supreme Court, Russia, China, voting rights -- may be the clearest example of rhetors' struggle for agenda and spin.

Spin is always a dispute over what's critically at stake and shaping perceptions and controlling the meanings of different events.. There is an objective world of facts -- there are hurricanes and death, of course -- that is undeniable, but suasory discourse is not simply about observable, so-called objective realities; it is a phenomenon in which human beings create, contest, and change audience attention and meanings.

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
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The Only Authentic Book of Persuasion: the Agenda-Spin Model (Authors Press, 2022)

Man and woman are the persuading animals.

There is no overriding issue more important in most people's daily life, life's pleasures and all of political matters than persuasion.

Many, if not most, matters are wholly related to persuasion, defined in this work on the Agenda-Spin theory, as the struggle of people to determine for their chosen audiences: 1. What we talk about and 2. What it means.

Persuasion is not the only determinant in life, and there are some matters mostly outside of persuasive control, such as congenital illness, physical attacks, weather, death, etc. Even these, however, will have elements of choice and certainly vary in spin and/or interpretation.

This work, unlike virtually every other work on this topic, examines persuasion as within the power of the persuader, not as the result of inexorable demands of reality, except in the cases listed above.

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
